On Tuesday, November 7, about fifteen gardeners gathered for a tour of the new Pollinator Victory Garden in Micanopy. The newly planted garden is located around the Bat House adjacent to the Post Office in this historic town about ten miles south of Gainesville.

Claudia Larsen, owner of the Micanopy Wildflower Nursery, created this garden. Many wildflower lovers from Micanopy, Alachua County Master Gardner volunteers, and other volunteers from around Alachua County worked on the garden.

Funding for the garden came from the Florida Wildflower Foundation, part of the Viva Florida Grant Foundation. The Town of Micanopy and the Old Florida Heritage Highway organization gave additional funding.

The garden is 50 x 50 feet, with a fence in the center surrounding the pole which elevates the Bat House, providing safe habitat for local bats. The fence will be planted with Carolina jessamine, passionflower vines and coral honeysuckle. There is space for

small trees and shrubs and another spot for tall wildflowers and grasses. The rest of the garden is planted with many different wildflowers including firebush, salvia, aster, coreopsis, yucca, goldenrod, ironweed, brown-eyed Susan and so many others! Only a few were in bloom on the day of planting, but these new plants will mature, and they will delight us and local pollinators with lots of colorful blooms, nectar, and pollen!

These recent plantings are already sprouting new growth, thanks to a timed irrigation system. Soon, benches for sitting and resting will add to the setting. Identification signs are planned for each species, enhancing the garden's educational value.

Learning about this new pollinator garden from the grower who designed and installed all the plants provided an insightful learning experience for the group.

Additionally, a total of 500 plants (75 trees, shrubs and grasses, and 425 wildflowers) were procured from three local native nurseries

and were planted by more than 20 volunteers over the first two weekends in October 2023.

#### TED MOORHEAD LAGOON HOUSE IS 20 YEARS OLD

Owned by the City of Palm Bay and managed by the Marine Resources Council (MRC), Ted Moorhead Lagoon House is the official welcome center for the Indian River Lagoon National Scenic Byway. It's an exceptional venue for school field trips, workshops, meetings, and exploration, as it houses an environmental learning center that helps tell the story of the Indian River Lagoon. Visitors arrive at Ais Lookout Point, an 11-acre city park named in honor of the native people of the lagoon that overlooks the waterway from atop a 30-foot-high natural bluff.

The idea for the Lagoon House began in 1998 when Ted Moorhead, a local lagoon advocate became aware of Florida Department of Transportation plans to construct a highway retention pond at Ais Lookout Point, former home to the Riverview Motel and an Ais shell mound. His wife, Ann, proposed the name "Lagoon House" and Palm Bay grant writer Dave White suggested that the National Scenic Byway program could potentially be a source of funding for construction of the facility. Soon after, a funding package was cobbled together to complete design and construction of the Lagoon House. Construction was made possible by grants of \$100,000 from the Florida Inland Navigation District, \$800,000 from the National Scenic Byways Program, and \$100,000 from FDOT.

Once constructed, the Lagoon House opened to the public with exhibits offering insights into the natural history of the Indian River Lagoon and promoting the Lagoon's preservation for future generations. The grand opening was made possible by a dedicated team of private and public contributors and a generous donation from Jan Smith and the

T.R. and Dorothy Tomlinson estate, who were the Riverview Motel owners.

Today, 20 years since it's opening, the City of Palm Bay, MRC and other partners are reimagining the property, which is in need of upgrades to showcase Low Impact Living and Low Impact Development practices while continuing to serve as a byway visitors center and environmental learning facility and always the center of the "lagoon/verse".

#### Happy Birthday to a Town of Penney Farms Resident

The Town of Penney Farms, including the JC Penney Memorial Scenic Highway organization recently celebrated a long-time town resident's birthday. While the town is currently making plans to celebrate it's 100-year anniversary, that momentous accomplishment pales in comparison with the town's oldest resident - a stately oak tree that in early January was celebrated for being 280 years old!

Born in the mid-1700s, one can well imagine the experiences and changes this oak has been part of over the years. In the mid-1700s, much of North America was caught in the struggles between England and France, more commonly known as King George's War while much of the Florida territory was under Spain's control.

Fast forward to today, this stately oak resides on private property in downtown Penney Farms near the Penney Retirement Community campus.

The Martin Grade Scenic Highway is one of the state's newest byways and for several years the organization has struggled to build and maintain momentum. Surrounded by large landowner properties and with no commercial businesses or residential communities to speak of on the corridor the organization looked for ways to better tell the corridor's story and attract interest in their 12-mile-long canopied byway.

In 2023, the organization, led by Tiffany Kincaid and the Keep Martin Beautiful team launched a social media campaign that delved into the

rich history and importance of the Martin Grade Scenic Byway. Through a series of captivating posts complemented by compelling historical and related imagery, the team aimed to captivate their audience. The response was overwhelming, with these posts sparking meaningful organic interactions and reaching over 521,700 individuals! The campaign also garnered 1,264 new likes to the byway organization's Facebook page, showcasing the power of storytelling and community engagement.
